Kristine M. Baber received her Ph.D. in Family Studies from the University of Connecticut. She is an Associate Professor in the Department of Family Studies and a Core Faculty member in Women's Studies at the University of New Hampshire. She also is the founding Director of the UNH Center on Adolescence which provides education, training, and research capacity to support the well being of adolescents and their families. In 2004, UNH named Kristine one of the university's first Outreach Scholars. She is coauthor of the book, *Women and Families*, the author of numerous book chapters, journal articles, and research reports. Kristine's current scholarly work focuses on preventing youth suicide and normalizing the use of mental health care. Kristine has taught ethics and professional practice in the Department of Family Studies for over 18 years and provides training and consultation on ethical practice. Her particular areas of interest include ethical decision making models, virtue ethics, and ethical risk management issues.

Ethics as Relational Practice: Transparency, Disclosure, & Risk Management

Recent approaches to ethical decision making emphasize the limitations of models concerned only with ethical principles and encourage consideration of the values and experiences of the therapist, as well as the culture and life context of the clients involved. This interactive workshop will provide an integrative approach to ethical decision making that includes both principle and virtue ethics and constructs ethical challenges and their resolutions as relational. We will focus specifically on disclosure, both self revealing (sharing personal information) and self involving (sharing reactions and responses to clients with them), and transparency (being open about methods, values, experiences, and exceptions to confidentiality). Approaching ethics as relational practice also raises new issues related to preventing and responding to ethical errors and missteps, so we will use the last segment of the workshop to explore the ethical management and prevention of errors. When and how should therapists acknowledge ethical errors? What constructive steps can be taken to protect clients, make reparations, minimize risk to therapists, and prevent recurrences? Recent research and theory will provide a framework for discussion of participant-generated ethical dilemmas.
