The social position of persons who identify outside of traditional dominant constructions of what a person’s sexual identity, gender identity, or sexual orientation “ought” to be, can affect couple and family well-being. This less powerful position can also affect the care of the diverse members of the LGBTTTQQIP (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Transsexual, Queer, Questioning, Intersex, Pansexual) community by couple and family therapists whether intentionally or unintentionally. This workshop will begin with a brief examination of the historical treatment of the LGBTTTQQIP population in therapeutic practice followed by an exploration of the ways in which the sexual and gender binaries are being deconstructed to become more fluid and how this deconstruction might present in therapy. The workshop will also examine the psychological effects of social norms on LGBTTTQQIP individuals, couples, and families, addressing such topics as non-pathologizing, heterosexual bias, genderism, self-identification, coming out, multiple-minority identities, parenting, and couple dynamics. We will also discuss relevant policies and debates in the mental-health arena and review the “best practices” proposed by various mental health disciplines. Relevant case examples will be utilized throughout the workshop.

At the end of the workshop participants will be able to do the following:

- A. Identify differences between sexual identity, gender identity, and sexual orientation and increase their understanding of the deconstruction of a binary understanding of each of those categories.
- B. Outline the history of mental health care treatment for members of the LGBTTTQQIP community and discuss critiques of that treatment
- C. Identify issues related to couples and families that may be encountered when working with members of this community and formulate possible treatment options
- D. Summarize current “best” practices with the LGBTTTQQIP community as proposed by various mental health disciplines
- E. Begin to identify their own biases related to sexual identity, gender identity, and sexual orientation
